● Page 2 Rotarians Against Malaria – Gloria Hargreaves



The speaker this week, Gloria Hargreaves, is the RAM Southern Region Supervisor and is a member of the Rotary Club of Emerald and District.

Gloria's presentation on Rotarians Against Malaria was informative and provided a horrific picture of the impact of malaria and the challenge in eliminating this disease. A quote from the World Health Organisation (WHO) highlights the problem-'Malaria is the biggest scourge the world has ever known'. 50% of the world is at risk of malaria, with high risk in subSaharan Africa. The number of deaths has increased over the last few years, up to 619,000 in 2021 and 70% of the deaths are children under 5. The increase in numbers is understandable given that Ministries of Health in many countries had to stop health programs to focus on dealing with COVID, leaving limited resources and funding for malaria elimination.

Another point of concern is that existing control strategies are becoming less effective due to mosquito resistance to insecticides, so the development of a vaccine is very important. One has been developed but is only about 30% effective; another is in development through a huge contribution from Rotary.

RAM was launched in 1995 when the incidence of malaria showed a sharp increase after the discontinuation of the use of DDT. It is a network of Rotarians with a RAM representative in each Rotary District in Australia, funded by donation from Rotary Clubs and individuals. RAM is a RAWCS activity (Rotary Australia World Community Service)

The goal of RAM is to see happy heathy children who are eager to get an education, so funding is critically important. The amount in the RAM account determines what activities can be funded.

The RAM program is intended to break the

cycle of infection and is a grass roots approach:

- Collaboration with other NGOs and Governments.
- Distribution of long lasting insecticidetreated mosquito nets (LLIN)
- Residual insecticidal spraying (RIS)
- Education
- Engineering environments (ensuring there is no stagnant water lying where mosquitos can breed)
- Controlling larvae
- PhD sponsorship
- Issues
- Donations have dwindled, although there has been increased external funding through several Global Grants
- RAM must re-engage with Districts and Clubs

As an indication of the progress towards elimination in various countries, Timor Leste was very close to malaria elimination but the impact of COVID has set this back a few years. The status of being malaria free has to be sustained for 3 years before WHO will declare it a malaria free country. It is hoped this can happen in Timor Leste by 2025. One issue has been local transmission across the border with West Timor. Fortunately, now there is a combined effort across all the Timor Island which will help it reach elimination.

RAM is always in need of volunteers to undertake intervention programs such as community assessments or to distribute flyers. They will have a stand at RICON 23 along with Malaria Partner International and RAM Global. For more information visit https://rawcs.org.au/ rotarians-againstmalaria/

Page 4 Conference session—Brett Sutton

A very informative session at the District Conference was given by Brett Sutton, the Chief Health Officer for Victoria, who became a very public face during the COVID pandemic.

Brett spoke very eloquently of his early years when he travelled extensively throughout the world and his realisation of the impact on health of access to public health services. He realised that improvement in health outcomes depended on strengthening systems, not just providing aid. For instance, child mortality halved in one year in Timor Leste with strengthened public health. He worked in various medical roles, including a stint with Medecin Sans Frontiers in Afghanistan where he dealt with 175 patients in a day! Brett realised that the symptoms he saw were a manifestation of the social disparities brought about by war and that clean water is the most powerful determinant of health. However, he found that he relished the quick decision making needed to cope with the vast numbers seeking medical aid.

When news broke of a new virus appearing in China that was transmitted between people, Brett was immediately aware that this had the potential for dire consequences. Most of the world made decisions too late during wave 1. The decision to cancel the Grand Prix at the last moment was an exceedingly difficult decision to make (an 'all-nighter') and he was thankful that the Health Minister supported him fully, even knowing that the State would suffer a \$50 million hit.

As wave 1 swept over Victoria, with a 1.5% fatality rate, the question

was always what was a proportionate response to the danger it posed. He was aware he would be vilified whatever the decision and could only make decisions, aimed at aggressive suppression of the virus, with the skills and experience available. With wave 2 when the virus was spread from hotel quarantine, the death rate was 1-2% but it was 1 in 3 in aged care. However, the lockdowns bought the State critical months to get vaccination in place and to strengthen the health system. As the vaccine has been rolled out there have been many things to applaud, such as a take-up of 68% who have had their 4th dose. There has been equity of vaccination across the regions and socio-economic status unlike much of the world. However, the pandemic has been not just a health crisis but also a social crisis, with loneliness, depression, financial stresses, bankruptcies and mortgage stress.

On a positive note, Brett was gratified by the care shown by the broader community to look after each other in 2020-2021.

During the pandemic the role of the media in the social commentary around Astra Zeneca was not helpful and the prevalence of misinformation and disinformation was of great concern. It was apparent that there needed to be stronger intercultural connection as often information came through country of origin news and social media, which were not always accurate. In fact Brett feels that social media is a 'cess pit' of misinformation. In late 2020 better communication was established and there needs to be continued trust and rapport to communicate with multi cultural groups. The need is for nuanced conversations, not just facts.

Brett had two key messages:

- 1. Get tested
- 2. Get vaccinated

People often look for the path of least resistance, for instance, taking the view that 'COVID does not really exist' or 'I'm all over this'. A memorable takeaway from this presentation was:

'The reality is that what you do is not just for you, it is for the community at large.'

One aspect of Brett's experience during COVID that clearly impacted him significantly was the confronting material about him that often appeared on social media, which Brett referred to several times as a 'cess pit'. An illustration of this is the fact that when he recently tweeted encouragement for people to get their fifth dose of the vaccine, he once again received death threats.

Now, after 15,000 deaths from COVID across Australia, there is negligible risk of another wave, but there will be other public health crises ahead from natural disasters and the like—such existential threats need to be faced with eyes wide open.


• Speaking of winners, second place in the Conference Bowls competition went to **Daryl**, who won a nice bottle of red.
