



Story Dogs-Margaret Gearon

Story Dogs is a reading support program • where selected children read to an • accredited dog and its handler. The chil- • dren are taken out of the classroom to a • quiet area in the school for a one-on-one session, lasting about 15-20 • minutes.

The students are chosen by the teacher as they believe they will benefit most from the program. Generally the selected students:

- are not comfortable reading out loud in front of others
- have fallen behind classmates and lost confidence
- may have few opportunities to practice reading outside school
- have trouble concentrating

When the session is complete the student is allowed to give the dog a treat and a pat, if they are comfortable with this.

There is very strict assessment of each dog's temperament to ensure they are obedient and willing and that they do not bark or lick the children. The safety of the children is paramount.

The outcomes from being involved in this program are very significant for the children.

- reading skills improve
- confidence soars
- focus and attention improves
- attitude towards learning improves
- develop greater confidence in reading aloud
- improved skill in self correction
- comprehension of what is being read improves
- behaviour improves

The many testimonials on the website attest to the progress made by the children who have been in the program.

Story Dogs started in 2009 and has grown significantly since then. For example, in 2011 there were 18 dog teams operating in 10 schools. By 2014 this had grown to 86 dog teams in 53 school. There are currently 590 dog teams in 357 school across six Australian states.




There is no Government funding for Story Dogs and all the workers are volunteers. It costs \$500 each year to put a dog team into a school. This cost includes the bag of books the dog handler takes with them, the reading rug for the dog to sit on, a dog vest, volunteer vest, vets fees and insurance.

The money to run Story Dogs comes from donations, sponsorship and fundraising. Many of the dogs are sponsored and schools that are involved often fundraise to support their team. Other ways that fundraising occurs is through donation boxes, 'Wear Orange on a Friday' days or having a day when all small change goes into a donation box.

The Club is very pleased to be able to donate \$350 to Story Dogs. We thank Margaret for taking time to visit us.

Marg shared with us an illustration of Rotary values demonstrated by Beryl Brown, from Peppertree Hill Retirement Village, a great supporter of our programs.

Beryl is very active at Peppertree in helping the residents give support in various ways to those in need. Beryl responded to a request to make a memory cushion for a local woman who has been recently bereaved. The result was a beautiful cushion made from the favourite jumper of the husband and incorporated several badges representing his interests, such as bowls and the Salvation Army band. It was expertly made and would be a great source of comfort for the grieving widow. The fact that it was made within 24 hours is also commendable. Well done, Beryl!

A multi-cultural wedding—Neha and Ahmad



We were pleased to welcome Neha and Ahmad to our meeting this week. Neha is Co-President of Knox Rotaract Club and the daughter of club members Rajeev and Anita.

Neha and Ahmad were married in January and they visited us to thank us for our good wishes at the time of their wedding. They also shared with us some of the details of their wedding as they designed their wedding celebrations to highlight the cultural heritage of both families, which is South Indian, North Indian and Indonesian, which is Ahmad's background.

In typical Indian style, the wedding took place over three days.

Day 1 started with the Registered Wedding with a small group of close family and friends present.

The rest of this day was spent in Mehndi preparation. This involved sitting for about 2 hours while the delicate and intricate henna bridal patterns were applied. In addition, to allow the henna ink to fully take effect, the recipient has to sit for about five hours afterwards before the extra ink can be washed off. Traditionally, bridal henna patterns extend all the way to the elbow and cover the feet as well. Hidden in the pattern is the name of the groom and the challenge is for the groom to find his name; it took Ahmad four days to find his name.

Day 2 continued the henna painting (Mehndi) as guests arrived and also had henna applied. Then followed Sangeet, a dance party with great food, dance performances and a fun atmosphere. Neha's photos showed that Anita and Rajeev demonstrated some unexpected dancing prowess at this event.





A typical henna pattern, similar to Neha's Day 3 followed with the Indian wedding and reception. The Indian wedding was again attended by just a small group of closest family and friends and Neha and Ahmad chose three traditional ceremonies to mark the day. One involved Ahmad placing a necklace around Neha's neck as a sign of commitment. The necklace they chose had been used by Neha's maternal grandmother, so proved a very emotional link to the family traditions. The reception was again a time for dancing and eating delicious north Indian food and enjoying the time together.

Neha commented how wonderful her family home looked when it was decorated for each of these celebration days. She also paid tribute to the amount of planning, and cleaning up, that was required. To finish their visit, Neha and Ahmad handed out small boxes of Indian sweets to all those in attendance.
