



SHEBA-Dr Shuvo Ahmed Sharif

Social Help Endeavour of Bangladesh (SHEBA) is about to celebrate 10 years of service to the community, having been launched in Jan 2013. SHEBA has developed from the early days with one health centre to a dual focus program: Primary Health Initiative and Women's Empowerment Project. Over these 10 years the funding has come mainly from fundraising event and from Rotary. In 2020 the fundraising event was online and raised a record \$16,140.

Primary Health Care Initiative

There are now 5 health centres, 3 fixed and 2 mobile, serving 35,000. One of these, in Mirzapur, opened in 2019 at the request of the union council and operates in premises provided by the council. The focus for all the health centres is on preventative care, curative treatment and health promotion, which covers topics such as hygiene, contraception, etc. A boat clinic operates during floods and the monsoon and in the low-lying areas to provide health care to people who would otherwise miss out. The fee for a consulation with the medical officer is around \$AU1.65, while home visits and the boat clinic are free of charge. All services are free of charge for those unable to pay. From November 2020 to August 2022, 11,014 patients have been seen, which does not count those seen on home visits.

The pandemic has provided many challenges. In addition to intermittent service disruption, two long-term medical staff left, necessitating the recruitment and training of new staff. With increased unemployment and poverty, free medication had to be handed out and many people were unable to pay for medical consultations.

In Dec 2021 SHEBA conducted a cervical and breast cancer awareness workshop for 31 attendees, using the services of an experienced campaigner from Dhaka.

The effectiveness of SHEBA is monitored closely by Dr Sharif and his associates. Site visits are made several times a year, there are regular meetings with the medical staff and management, community feedback meetings are held in person and virtually and regular reports have to be submitted.



IMAGINE ROTARY

Women Empowerment Project.

Chalan Beel Selai Proshokkhon O Biponon Kendro

Commenced in September 2021 with seed money of \$15,000 from two American doctors, this project will provide 3 months of sewing training for unemployed and destitute women. So far 5 women have completed their training and 2 have set up a home based tailoring business, marketing their goods (shown in the photo) on line.



2. Noksheee Katha Training programme

This programme involves training in hand made quilt embroidery with a trainer from Dhaka. So far 31 women have been involved and most have started working as independent entrepreneurs.

Looking ahead there is a plan to revise the Primary Health Care to meet changing needs in the community. The plan involves:

- Medical officer consultation service 6 days a week; 3 pm 9 pm for a fee of \$1.67
- Sub-assistant community medical officer (SACMO) consultation service 2 days a week; 9 am—2 pm for a fee of \$0.50
- 1 session dedicated to free screening for 3 non-communicable disease (high blood pressure, diabetes and kidney disease: \$2
- Home visits for the elderly and disabled and after hours on call service by SACMO.

This initiative will required a budget of \$11,000 and will run as a pilot program for a year, to see how it works.

The Women Empowerment Programme requires a budget of \$3,000.

There are also plans for vision care for the elderly and community development projects such as toilets, solar panels and provision of clean water.

Immediate logistical needs are for: ECG, portable ultrasound machine, air conditioners x 2, fans x 2, solar panels, furniture, procedure room equipment.

An interesting update this week from David Ferrier, the Founder of Treasuring our Trees.

David is a trained arborist who swung into action after the violent storm on June 9th, 2021, which ravaged the Dandenong Ranges and other surrounding areas. He initially provided support helping to clear felled trees and to deliver items such as firewood, donated foodstuffs and the like. Ultimately his mission came to be to use the timber from these very large trees for community and primary school projects. As well as making use of the timber, David sees this project as a way of teaching the next generation about sustainability and to connect them with nature in a stimulating way.

With this goal, Treasuring Our Trees (TOT) became a worthy recipient of funds from the Rotary District 9810 Dandenong Ranges Storm Recovery Appeal, led by Alan Lunghusen as Chair of the committee. These funds were distributed at the Storm Recovery Festival in March.

These funds have enabled TOT to purchase equipment such as a Lucas Mill to process the logs and the program of using the logs for projects has begun. David showed some wonderful photographs of the creative way the timbers are being used in the more than 20 Primary Schools that have joined the program. The fairy houses and explorer trails would be very enticing to young children and provide a lot of stimulus for imaginative play. Other uses for the logs such as building beds for kitchen gardens also provide much scope for learning in a very engaging way.

In recent months TOT has gained a large grant from Bushfire Recovery, via the local councils in the area, and this has helped build TOT further. David paid tribute to Rotary and to Alan and Robyn Lunghusen who have joined the Board of Treasuring Our Trees. We wish David all the best with this valuable project.
