Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA)-Paris Hindby

In a passionate and engaging presentation, Paris shared with us some details of the RYLA program which she attended in late June. Of great impact was the excerpt she read from her diary, written on the first night, where she reflected on the new experiences she was facing. As a natural introvert who is happy with her own company, Paris felt she was often reluctant to meet new people and get to know them. The 2 hour trip on the bus, with rounds of 'Speed dating' was very challenging and made her feel like putting her headphones in and shutting out the world. But knowing a bit about a few people and having had a lot of laughs along the way helped with the arrival at camp. Her reflection for the day ended with 'I met so many awesome people today and it has kind of been a bit overwhelming, but it is pushing me out of my comfort zone.'

One session that left an impact on Paris was on public speaking. The gold nugget takeaway from this is that you can flip a negative character trait into a positive trait. Col Fink, the presenter, encouraged them to be authentic and present from the heart. Another tip was that tiny courage is big courage.

Paris' favourite session was on goal setting, which involved four steps:

- 1. Intention
- 2. Motivation
- 3 Presence
- 4. Adapt

This is a very useful framework for forming long term goals, which Paris has since used to great effect with a group of young people with whom she works.

The final session on the first day was on self-care, which is an aspect of life that Paris felt did not receive enough of her attention as she did not often find the time. Her approach of always being willing to take on a task made finding time for self-care difficult, but she realized from this session that it was important to change this aspect of her life.



They have kept in contact since via Facebook and the camp experience has been completed with Zoom meetings and other activities such as rock climbing still to come.




The first two weeks after camp, Paris reflected and journaled a lot about her experiences from camp. She acknowledges that she feels stronger as a human being and has felt different since returning from camp. She came back with a glow and came back more motivated to achieve her goals and dreams and determined to make a change in the world. She is constantly thinking: 'What's next? What is next to achieve the goals I have set out for myself.'

Paris reflected further:

'RYLA has a special place in my heart, and I am so fortunate and grateful for the nomination and acceptance to attend such a beautiful journey. This camp came at a pivotal time in my life, and it was an experience I will never forget.'

- Thank you also to the 'production team' helpers who come early each week to set up the equipment. **Ian** in particular often comes early, just in case he is needed. Thank you!



There will also be an information table that will be manned, with a collection tin and information about Lift the Lid and ARH.


Bunnings has also offered to provide a prize for a raffle, the proceeds of which will also go to Lift the Lid.
