Rotary ANZPI Zone 8 Conference

Last weekend Daryl and Jenny Moran attended the Australia, New Zealand and Pacific Islands Zone 8 Conference (ANZPI), in Canberra.

This Conference follows on from training for incoming District Governors and was attended by Daryl and Jenny in 2019, as part of Daryl's DG training. The big thrill for them both this week was being able to meet up in person with the rest of Daryl's 'DG class', for the first time since 2019.

The Conference was notable as it combined Rotary and Rotaract in the one event, which brought a great sense of optimism that Rotary is in good hands, not just in the future but NOW.

There are reports of a couple of the sessions in this newsletter.



One thought provoking speaker was Larry Lunsford who is a Trustee of the Rotary Foundation.

Larry reflected on progress with the End Polio Now campaign, noting that there have been some speed humps this year with new cases of polio in some countries that have been free of polio for years. However, there is a resolve and a strategic plan in place to reach the Rotary goal of eradicating polio by the end of 2023.

He outlined that last year there were 391 million doses of polio vaccine administered, thanks to Rotary. This amounts to 20c per dose.

However, figures show that only 1 in 10 Rotarians, from around the world, donate to the End Polio Now campaign. Something to think about, especially with the speakers we will hear at next week's meeting.

Page 2 Rotary Response to the Ukraine Crisis—John Hewko



John Hewko, the General Secretary and Chief Executive Officer of Rotary International, spoke from Evanston via video call to the Zone 8 Conference, giving some great insights into the situation in Ukraine.

The continued conflict is having unimaginable consequences, with over 7 million refugees crossing into neighbouring countries and over 8 million internally displaced. To date there have been 135,000 civilian deaths, 4,500 missile strikes and 8,000 air raids. Somewhere between 20-50% of the energy infrastructure has been destroyed and this has unleashed food scarcity and energy scarcity across the world. It has been estimated that it will take \$1 trillion to rebuild Ukraine.

'Rotary can help pick up the pieces when rebuilding starts' As a member of the Rotary Club of Kyiv, John was shocked at the outbreak of the war on February 23rd this year. However, very quickly the systems in place with Rotary swung into action to devise a plan to help Ukraine. A Disaster Relief Fund was started and with support from all over the globe, more than **\$US15 million** was donated in a few months. With in-kind donations and grants directly to Clubs in Ukraine, John estimates that a total nearer \$US30 million has been donated. On a personal note, some of John's Rotary colleagues have lost jobs and businesses and some have joined the armed forces.

So far around \$US12 million from the Response Fund has been disbursed through 359 grants to provide medicine, medical equipment, fire engines, ambulances and emergency housing. Rotary Clubs in neighbouring countries have been very active providing assistance in many ways, and interestingly, membership of the 62 Clubs in Ukraine has increased as people have seen the relevance and impact of Rotary in such dire circumstances.

John recounted the recent history of Ukraine and its pathway to independence and reflected on what effect the war with Russia will have on this process. After the vote for Independence in 1991 Ukraine was still a very divided country, with different language groups, different ethnic groups and no sense of national unity. There was also massive corruption and allegations of rigged elections.

Putin's actions in this war, where Russian speaking cities have been destroyed, has effectively created a unified Ukraine that will be unbreakable. As rebuilding takes place, Ukraine needs to take the final step of dealing with corruption and putting in place freedom of the press and a fair system of justice. This meaningful change will enable Ukraine to finally become a western democratic country.

In all this, when rebuilding starts, Rotary can help 'pick up the pieces', assisting with the needs of the people who will be suffering from the trauma inflicted on them.

Page 3 Lessons for volunteers—Thamluang Cave Rescue

A fascinating session at the Zone 8 Conference was presented by Major Alex Rubin from Tenterfield who had an important role in the rescue of the Wild Boars soccer team, 12 children and their coach, who were trapped in a cave in Thailand for 9 days.

Alex was deployed in this role as he is the ADF's highest qualified Thai linguist and he was involved in risk assessment and strategy planning.

The story is familiar to many, especially with 3 movies and 2 documentaries since, but Alex's on-the-ground experience was enlightening. He described the harsh conditions inside the narrow tunnel network that covered the 4 km from the opening to the cave. It was very challenging, with 800-1000 people working in the narrow passageways with steep and slippery sections. It was hot, wet and stinky as excrement built up as moving outside for such purposes was impossible. Inexperience of the Thai divers caused problems and as we know, one Thai diver lost his life in the attempt. Various courses of actions were proposed and each was given an estimate of the loss of life that would result. The final solution that was used had to receive the approval of the King of Thailand and it was initially given an estimate of a loss of 30-60% of the children.



In preparation for the rescue, over 200 divers worked non-stop to build a supply of 100's of oxygen cylinders distributed along the passage to the cave where the team waited for rescue. As was detailed in the media worldwide, eventually over 2 days 11 specialist divers

were able to reach the children and in a miraculous result, brought them and the coach out with 100% survival. The success was in part due to Australians Dr Richard Harris and Craig Challen, two very experienced divers.

Alex reflected on some of the lessons from his experience that can be applied to other international aid efforts.

1. Sometimes too much help creates chaos. In this case the presence of over 1000 media, crammed into the spot in the jungle where the rescue effort worked from, put a great strain of provision of food and other resources.

2. Volunteers and donations need to be well co-ordinated to effectively reach the Point of Need.

3. Working in a different cultural context needs tolerance and patience as all those involved may have different understanding of the issues.


