



District Governor's Visit

There was a buzz in the room this week, with a large gathering of Club members attending for the visit of District Governor Ken Miller.

DG Ken complimented the Club on being enthusiastic and active as he highlighted some of the key projects and activities. This list included support for the Foundation, Youth Programs, Foothills Community Care, Days for Girls and the Primary School's Speech Competition. He also offered congratulations on the Satellite Club and the recent Knox Art Show, commenting that the involvement of our Club has probably saved the Art Show from ceasing to run.

Club members who are involved in District roles were commended: Neil White, who is the Conference Treasurer, Alan Lunghusen RAWCS Chair, Carol Constantine Assistant Governor and IPDG Daryl Moran.

DG Ken outlined his four key goals for his year.

1. Growing Rotary.

A number of programs are in place to help clubs with membership. PDG Alma Reynolds and her team have a very effective five-point plan to increase membership, the first step of which is to ensure that the Club is vibrant and attractive to new members.

This program has proven its effectiveness with one club increasing its membership by 9 this year and District numbers up by 6.

A further program is a Young Members' Taskforce, which has provided suggestions as to how Rotary needs to change to attract and retain younger members. A paper that was prepared by this group has been circulated widely and has a lot to offer. Clubs have also received a list of Alumni: these people need to be followed up as they may be prepared to help with projects, or perhaps even join Rotary.

'Connections', a section on the District website, provides the opportunity to promote a business through the Rotary network. DG Ken is happy to receive business cards to be added to this site.

Tamminya

Tamminya House is a local organisation that provides emergency housing to families struck by crisis. This may involve the loss of a

job, family violence or substance abuse. Tamminya House provides transitional accommodation in a safe and respectful environment, to help families get back on their feet. Tamminya House is largely funded by the operation of their Op Shop in Rose St, Upper Ferntree Gully.

Plans to support Tamminya House this Christmas are progressing well. The festive hamper that will be donated to Tamminya House for them to raffle will be assembled this week and delivered to them. In addition:

- The Club will be providing pamper packs to the parents who are residing in Tamminya House. The items for these have been purchased from Club funds and a photo of one is shown below. An additional \$50 per child will be donated to enable Tamminya House to purchase toys/gifts for the children who are resident at Christmas time.
- 3. The Club will be donating a ham to be used for their Christmas dinner at Tamminya House.





Weight of shoes collected so far is 14.7 kg.

The collected shoes will be delivered to collection boxes at Rebel Sport, a program which is run by the non-profit organisation Tread Lightly and the Australian Sporting Goods Association. The useful component of the shoes are separated and made into items such as gym mats and play ground surfacing. This is done locally by Save Our Soles. The aim is to keep some of 100 million pairs of discarded shoes out of landfill. Last year, 5 tonnes of shoes were able to be repurposed.
