DG Partner Project Finale

An enormous thank you goes to all the Club members who supported Jenny on Wednesday November 23rd for her Project Finale event.

On this evening, Milli Wata-Marshall, team leader of the Fijiwest Days for Girls Chapter, shared some insights from her experience with the sewing and distribution of Days for Girls kits in Fiji.

Milli highlighted how the sanitary hygiene kits are an excellent option for girls in Fiji as they are environmentally friendly, with no cost, long lasting and help promote good health and hygiene. The education program that accompanies the kit distribution is extremely valuable, not just to increase the knowledge of the recipients about the biology of their body, but to encourage empowerment of girls. The incidence of early pregnancy in Fiji has long term impacts— curtailing access to education, hence limiting job prospects for young mothers.

The second part of the evening was spent tracing and cutting PUL (polyurethane laminate) which provides the waterproof lining in the DfGs shields. Milli was delighted to be able to take home with her several hundred pieces of PUL cut to size and shape. She has arranged to be able to share these with other teams that are being established in the Pacific region.

Another aspect of Milli's visit to Melbourne was a visit to the Donations in Kind warehouse in Footscray. It was clear that Milli viewed this place as a treasure trove, with so much medical equipment, school desks and the like that could be put to good use in Fiji. The cost of shipping is a real limitation to getting such equipment to Fiji at the minute.

Milli has been in Australia to attend the Days for Girls Conference as she is the leader of the Fiji West Days for Girls team. The chance to spend time with a Rotarian from another part of the world is a priceless opportunity to chat about the similarities and differences of our Rotary experience. It becomes clear that the context in which a club operates has a significant impact on what projects are most appropriate, but also that many of the challenges are the same.

Milli joined the Rotary Club of Lautoka 9 years ago, when it was an all male club, and it now has 16 members, 9 of whom are women, with most members in their 30s or 40s. Milli has been President three times and is currently Director of Community Service.

Milli's passion in Rotary is for Maternal Child and Health programs, as the need is so evident in the lives of people around her. The role of a woman in traditional Fijian village society is dominated by the man in her life and her role as primary carer for the children, with large families being quite usual. Rural women do not work outside the home and domestic violence is common, on many occasions fuelled by alcohol use. Access to health care and education about health issues is limited and people often do not seek medical advice until the issue has escalated significantly.

Taking on the role of distribution of Days for Girls kits and delivering the education program that accompanies the kits, Milli has found an opportunity to bring valuable information to young girls, and older women, living in remote parts of Fiji, including on the smaller islands. She also does counselling work for the Fiji Cancer Society which provides a further opportunity to support women from remote communities.

With her work for Days for Girls, Milli has found that the education program that accompanies the distribution of the hygiene kits is really a matter of holistic health education, touching on many aspects of health and safety, including empowering women to deal with domestic violence. By educating girls it is hoped to break the cycle of early pregnancy, occurring sometimes as early as 14 or 15, and the life of domestic drudgery that follows. She has noticed that the older women are often as absorbed with the information as the young girls for whom it is designed, as the lack of knowledge of their body, even for mature women, is significant.



A key practical project of the Rotary Club of Lautoka has been to provide 'Mother and Baby Packs' for women in hospital who sometimes, due to poverty or ignorance, come to give birth without the basics needed for a new baby. The packs cost around \$85 each and include face cloths, baby cream, cloth nappies, pads, plastic pants, vests, safety pins, washing powder, a bucket and flannel blanket. The Rotary Club also shows its care for the new mother with 'Little Mother' packs consisting of essentials for the mother—deodorant, toothpaste, toothbrush, shavers, bath soap and coconut oil.

Reduce, Recycle, Repurpose

Over the last few weeks, many bags have been moved from one car boot to another at our Rotary meetings, bags containing items that are destined for a 'second life' in one form or another.

- 1. Foreign coins—Over 4 kg of foreign coins have been donated this week, which will be sent via Ron Brooks from the Rotary Club of Forest Hill to UNICEF. Over the last five years District 9810 has collected over 600 kg of coins, worth more than \$17,000, to be used to improve the welfare of children by improving access to clean water, supporting health initiatives including vaccination programs, providing basic education and ensuring protection from exploitation.
- 2. Aluminium foil blister packs.— Four large bags of foil blister packs have been dropped in to Biome at Brickworks Burwood. The foil will be removed and repurposed.
- 3. Hotel soaps—A collection of small hotel soaps has been dispatched to Days for Girls Fiji for inclusion in the sanitary hygiene kits being distributed to girls in remote areas of Fiji.
- 4. Worn out shoes—As noted last week, we have collected over **14 kg** of worn out sports shoes which will be delivered to Rebel Sport, with the knowledge that the useful components will be separated and reused. Further contributions are welcome during December.

There are also places to recycle plastic bottle tops and used stamps, to support organisations in their charity work.

All members are encouraged to keep sorting their rubbish to minimize landfill and ensure the maximum life is gained from the use of precious resources. Bring items to a meeting and they will be distributed to the appropriate person/place.

The wider world of Rotary—A Chat with Rotarian Milika Wata-Marshall contd

In Fiji, as in Australia, the challenge for Rotary is to attract and retain new members, particularly members in the younger age bracket.

The Rotary Club of Lautoka passed through a challenging period a few years ago, when the membership became very small. However, in recent years it has begun to grow again, with most members now in their 30s or 40s and the oldest member 63. The style of meeting and the projects performed reflect the interests and availability of the members, many of whom have demanding career and family commitments. Formal meetings are still held, but once a month the meeting is a coffee morning. Movie nights are popular for fundraising and as a social outlet for Club members. The Club projects, such as revegetating mangroves, are designed with a specified timeline, so a long-term commitment is not required. RC of Lautoka has chartered a Rotaract club and makes it a priority to support this group and maintain close links with it.

Milli's Club has been a partner in some aid projects when equipment has been sent from overseas countries, but all too often the fine detail of sending items, such as hospital equipment, has not been thought through sufficiently. To have an expensive piece of donated medical hardware sitting unused in a hospital because no one has been trained to use it is a great shame. The lesson for all overseas projects is to ensure due diligence is done to make it an effective project.

Thank you to Milli for sharing her insights and highlighting that there are many similarities in the challenges facing Rotary Clubs in our two countries.

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Let's continue to collect worn out shoes. Bring them to the next meeting on December 6th to give to Kate.
