



Peter Markowich, Sea Shephard

Chair for this meeting, PP Jeff Somers, introduced Peter Markowich from Sea Shephard Australia. Peter began his presentation by explaining what Sea Shephard does and many of us were surprized by the global nature of the organization and the depth of resources that it is able to contribute to meet its objectives.

Sea Shepherd is an international, non-profit marine conservation organization that campaigns to defend, conserve, and protect the world's ocean. Poachers plunder marine life sanctuaries with impunity, and illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing goes unchecked in the high seas far from the eyes of international authorities and public scrutiny. International laws and agreements exist to protect ocean wildlife and marine habitats, but they can be difficult to enforce because of lack of political will, insufficient economic resources, or transnational boundaries that blur jurisdiction. Where a law enforcement vacuum exists, Sea Shepherd acts to fill that void. Illegal, unreported and unregulated (IUU) fishing is a global problem that threatens the health of marine ecosystems as well as the livelihood of coastal fishermen. Legal fishing operations that observe quotas and by-catch laws are already forced to compete for fewer and fewer fish, yet an estimated 15-40% of the total global catch is caught illegally. The problem is particularly acute for developing nations which often lack the resources to enforce local fishing laws, which is why Sea Shepherd works with governments like in Liberia and Gabon to make a real difference for the future of our ocean.

Sea Shepherd has been using direct action to stop illegal whale poachers around the world since 1979. After commercial whaling almost drove whales to extinction, a global moratorium was put into place in 1986. However, some countries have refused to recognize the ban. Norway and Iceland continue commercial whaling, and the Faroe Islands continue to kill pilot whales and other cetaceans traveling through their coastal waters. The Japanese send their fleet all the way to the Southern Ocean Whale Sanctuary each Austral summer to slaughter hundreds of whales under the guise of "scientific research", a claim rejected by the IWC as well as the International Court of Justice and the Australian Federal Courts. Since the first trip to Antarctica in 2002, Sea Shepherd's Southern Ocean Whale Defense direct-action campaigns have successfully prevented the slaughter of over 6000 whales. Sea Shepherd has also opposed the slaughter of seals in Canada since 1978. Despite a ban on the import of seal products into the US and EU, Canada continues to club thousands of seal pups to death every year.

Peter gave us a number of examples of pollution by Commerce – plastics are a major issue with firms like Coke indicating that they won't change their practices until there is a commercial benefit to them. We've all seen footage of plastic pollution in the oceans and the size of the swirls, eddies and floating masses that will not breakdown and if we don't do something about will only increase in size.

Peter took a number of questions before Chairman Jeff thanked him for his presentation with Rotary Club of Rowville Lysterfield.


